Minimising Restraint

One of our school policies, available to read on 'Schooldocs' through our school website, addresses the use of physical restraint to manage student behaviour. This policy lines up with and supports the legal requirements of the Education and Training Act (2020), while prioritising the wellbeing of our students and staff.

In this policy, 'physical restraint' refers to the use of physical force to control, limit, or calm a student's movement against their wishes, whether it involves their whole body or a part of it. At our school, only teachers are authorised to restrain a child. However, all staff are required to complete online modules where they learn the physical restraint guidelines, which include recognising what causes stress, understanding students' needs that aren't being met, and taking steps to prevent, reduce, and address student distress.



Our policy states that physical restraint should only be used as a last resort, when all three of the following conditions are met:

- 1. There is risk of significant harm physical or emotional to the student or another person.
- 2. There is no other reasonable option.
- 3. It is only as forceful as needed and for the shortest possible time.

Should physical restraint be used, as a last resort for managing a child's behaviour, we will inform the child's parent or guardian as soon as possible. Whānau and the child are then welcome to meet with me and/or the teacher involved to debrief together in the days following the restraint.

If you have any concerns or questions about the use of restraint at Pomare School, please don't hesitate to come and chat with me about it.
